HISTORICAL ACCOUNT

OF

ATHENS, &c.

THENS, the chief City of that Province of Greece, formerly called Attica; which, though at prefent reduced so low, yet stands so high in Fame, as to dispute Precedence with every other City in the World. If you consider her Antiquity, the Valour, Power, Learning, &c. of her Inhabitants, or any other Quality which makes a Place illustrious and renowned, the still sits triumphant. Neither hath any City more experienced the Effects of good and bad Fortune. In the Time of her Splendor, the Athenians boassed their Origin from the Lands they inhabited; their Name from the Goddess Minerva, the being known by that of Aohna, and would scarce allow the Sun to have shone before them: They planted many Colonies, to whom they gave Names and Laws; of which Meursus reckons Forty.

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But on leaving the credulous, and confulting the more judicious Historians, we find that Cecrops was the first that reduced the Inhabitants of Attica, the Offspring of the Carians and Aonians, under a political Government, and by that Means advanced himself to be their King; his Dominions contained all within the Mountains Gerania, Oenoa, Parnes, and Lycabettus; that is, from the Islbmus, to Oropus, near the Mouth of the River Asopus, as the most advantageous; he made choice of this Rock, being situated in a large Plain, (the Plan of which may be seen in Plate I.) near the Middle of the Country, thereon to build the Metropolis of his Kingdom, calling it, and the whole Territory by his Name Cecropia; though before it had been called Attica and Ionia, from Ion, the Son of Xuthus.

This as related, came to pass, not long after *Deucalion*'s Flood, eight Hundred and thirty Years before the Building of *Rome*, and about a Thousand five Hundred and eighty Years before the Incarnation of our Saviour; to which adding, a Thousand seven Hundred and fifty-nine Years, it will be three Thousand, three Hundred, and thirty-nine Years ago, that *Athens* was built. Yet this Account cannot be absolutely justified, the Chronologers themselves differing in their Accounts some Years. The *Marmoria Oxoniensia* compute, three Thousand three Hundred and thirty-seven Years, And *Helvicus*, three Thousand three Hundred and twenty-three.
